I have always loved Easter morning!. Growing up Easter sunrise was the opportunity to sing with the opening rays of the dawn, Up From The Grave He Arose; which remains a moving experience in my life to this day.

An experience that now our children faithfully enjoy just after 6:45 at St. Mary's in Rock Valley on Easter morning. Celebrating at the first lights of day reminds us of the ways that the women were met at the empty tomb and later the disciples. Filled with awe and trembling they were spoken to by angels. He is not here; he is Risen! Remember how he told you. (Luke 24:6) He is risen! Those words capture the joy of Easter. Jesus Christ has risen from the grave. He has conquered the fear, pain, and evil of death. The ultimate enemy of mankind has been conquered. Jesus has risen, he has risen indeed is what we are longing to say to one another on this coming Easter morning. Easter is a day of celebration. Then they sang and left the borrowed upper room and went out into the darkness of the garden of Gethsemane.

In that common place on the hillside overlooking Jerusalem the full-grown evil of Satan filled the heart of Judas as he came up to Jesus and kissed him away to death, for 30 silver coins. For the brief riches of the world he gave over the world's greatest treasure to captors who would beat him, spit on him and condemn him to death.



and his dad is in Sioux City.
























Songs of Naamah by Gayle Walhof

"Sharing our Easter Inheritance"

After David Clarke's mother died in a cycling accident, she left him \$125,000. Inspired by how his mom had lived, he decided to share that inheritance with his community. Clarke chose four organizations that assist people in poverty, those with special needs and others. Liverpool (U.K.) Kids Plant to Plate received one-fourth of the money to teach urban kids about food growth and preparation. Team Oasis, which provides free meals and positive opportunities to disadvantaged families, also received 25% of the funds, as did two other nonprofits.

Through Jesus' death and resurrection, we too have an inheritance (see Colossians 1:12). Because we did nothing to earn this abundant love and life — and because God teaches us to serve and care for others — we look for ways to share it.

Unlike Clarke's monetary windfall, however, our gifts of salvation, grace, joy, love, and blessing never run out. In fact, the more we share Jesus' love through word and deed, the more we experience it ourselves. As Clarke keeps his mom's spirit alive by following her example, so we, as Easter people, make the Spirit of God known far and wide.

"Earth-Shaking Victory"

On Ash Wednesday in 2001, a 6.8 magnitude earthquake shook the Seattle area. Charlie and Ann Lewis, copastors in Snohomish, Washington, reflected on the timing:

"While most years we prefer to think of Lent as a contemplative journey of faith as we walk with Jesus toward Jerusalem and the cross, this year we are thinking of how God turned the world upside down at Calvary. From the cross, Jesus cried out with a loud voice, and his life was finished. Then the earth shook violently, the curtain in the temple was torn in two and rocks were split apart. The God who identified with us in our humanity in the incarnation of Jesus Christ demonstrated in that moment the depth of divine love for us — a love that leads God to choose the path of suffering and sacrifice.

"Three days later, the earth shook again — another violent earthquake, and the stone in front of the tomb was rolled away. Then the crucified Christ threw aside the burial cloths, emerging from the darkness of the tomb to walk in the dew of the grass as dawn was breaking across the sky. God had declared victory over sin and death itself. That victory was for us. God has given us a glorious life that extends into eternity."
