



#### "Mine, Ours, & His"

If we are really honest with ourselves the title of this piece would be in the exact order in which we view possessions or anything in this world that can rightly belong to anyone of us. We seem to always be on the lookout for ourselves, we view ourselves number one. If my needs are met then the world is at its best, I can move forward knowing that I am taken care of. Once my needs are met, I can perhaps look and inquire into the details of my fellow man. How is he doing? Does he need anything? If he does, can I give what I don't need, but perhaps it's been already picked through? He's okay with partial things, isn't he? Oh yeah, we can't forget about God. I have divided up the bounty between myself and my neighbor, there still is a little bit left that neither of us have taken. I guess, it's an opportunity to give it to God.

If we are further honest with ourselves the scenario described in the previous paragraph happens on a regular basis. We take what we think rightfully belongs to us as individuals, leave the "leftovers" for our fellow man and neighbor and then give the remaining pieces to God. We may even pat ourselves on the back, believing that we have done good, that we have done our work in God's kingdom. In reality, though, we have hindered the work of God's kingdom and hurt ourselves, our fellow man, and our relationship with God in the process.

I think it's safe to say that we all would recognize that the title has to be reversed. Once we get past our own greed and jealousy, we realize that everything that we have or possibly could have in this lifetime belongs to him. It is his, his to do with what he wants, his to distribute, his to keep. Once we recognize that we are under God we recognize the communal relationship that we share with our fellow man. We carry this out by sharing with them in times of need and in times of plenty, in times of hardship and in times of prosperity. Regardless of the item or the person, we give out of a love for them and ultimately for God. Then we have the opportunity to look inward to look at ourselves and assess what we need. God will give us all that we need to live, we will be lacking in nothing. Even more so will we be blessed if we focus on the other two groups first.

Reorganizing this title is hard to do in our minds and sometimes even harder to live out. But the great thing about this reversal is that by reversing we start with God first; he will give us all that we need in order to live and thrive as individuals and as helping community. He knows what we need and he also knows the needs of the members of our communities. It is only in his help and with his strength that we can reverse the title and turn from feelings of selfishness to feelings of surrender and sharing.

Want to have a richer Thanksgiving this year and ultimately a richer life? Consider reversing the title of this piece to reflect God first, our fellow neighbor and community second and finally ourselves last. In doing so we can begin to structure our lives the way God intended. It may not be easy or natural for us to do but Lord willing we can begin to see the blessings that will abound from our heavenly father to our community and then to ourselves. Then, we can truly exclaim, "Praise God from whom all blessings flow!"

#### "The Incarnation"

At the center of Christmas is Jesus, both fully God and fully man. "In Bethlehem, humility and glory in their extremes were joined," wrote pastor R.G. Lee (1886-1978). When Jesus came to earth, Lee explained, he descended:

- · from the heights of glory to the depths of shame,
- from the wonders of heaven to the wickedness of earth,
- · from exaltation to humiliation,
- from the throne to the tree,
- · from dignity to debasement,
- from worship to wrath,
- · from the halls of heaven to the nails of earth,
- · from the coronation to the curse,
- from the glory place to the gory place!

"Born in a stable! Cradled in a cattle trough! Wrapped in swaddling clothes of poverty!" Lee wrote. "No room for him who made all rooms! [No] place for him who made and knows all places! Oh, deep humiliation of the Creator — born of the creature, woman! But in his descent was the dawn of mercy. Because we cannot ascend to him, he descends to us."

#### "Look Upon Love"

Let us then meditate upon the Nativity just as we see it happening in our own babies. I would not have you contemplate the deity of Christ, the majesty of Christ, but rather his flesh. Look upon the baby Jesus. Divinity may terrify people. Inexpressible majesty will crush them. That is why God took on our human flesh and blood, that God should not terrify us but rather that with love and favor God would console and comfort us. ~Martin Luther

#### "The Light of Life"

Most sand comes from coral and rocks that get ground into tiny grains. But in a few places, like some beaches of Japan, the bits of sand are shells or skeletons that once housed single-celled organisms. #### "That's A (Re)wrap!"


The Reintgen family in North Carolina will always remember Christmas 2023. At 3 a.m. on December 25, their 3-year-old son woke them up, asking for scissors to open his new action-figure toy. "That's when we realized something had gone terribly wrong," said Scott, his dad.

A quick trip downstairs revealed a mess of unwrapped gifts under the family's Christmas tree. "There was not one thing that he left unscathed," Scott said. The boy, in his defense, said he was just trying to help everyone know what they'd received.

With only hours until their other children awoke, the Reintgens were determined to save Christmas. Mom Katie raced to rewrap gifts, even managing to get most nametags back on the correct packages. Instead of being angry, the parents found humor in the ordeal. Afterward, they explained to their son the joy that people experience from receiving — and opening — their own presents.

Morals of the story? Remember this 3-year-old when you get overeager for certain parts of the holidays. Don't rush through anything, and let others enjoy Christmas at their own pace too. When something goes wrong, don't panic. Like the Reintgens, find joy in any unexpected glitches and grinches you encounter throughout the season.

#### **UPDATE ON CORNERSTONE**

2 Chronicles 7:13-14 says: "When I shut up the heavens so that there is no rain, or command locusts to devour the land or send a plague among my people, if my people, who are called by my name, will humble themselves and pray and seek my face and turn from their wicked ways, then I will hear from heaven, and I will forgive their sin and will heal their land.

Over the summer and at the fall Classis meetings I shared the ways God has been working powerfully through a time where many in the prison have been hurting, or at least longing for better days. There has been a series of sweeping changes the last year that have decreased opportunities for the men to engage in community, worship practice, work, and recreation. Tensions rose much over the summer and areas of the prison experienced radical reduction in movement. Then the entire Sioux Falls Prison Complex went into a near month long lockdown where all outside religious volunteers were not allowed to continue providing religious programming in the prison. We called on our partner churches to pray, we were hoping for healing and wellbeing for our incarcerated brothers in Christ, for restoration of a functional chapel schedule, for changes that would increase the religious liberties and opportunities for our men rather than the gradual decrease that seemed to have set in.

Once we got back in, our time slots for worship were experiencing less reduction from schedule trouble. Our Bible Study attendance has grown significantly. The hunger for resources has skyrocketed with the pamphlets that we provide giving reformed answers to life's harder questions being taken from the chapel faster than any other time in the last three years. More recently the state removed the warden from her post at the Sioux Falls Prison Complex. That same week we learned that an effort was being made to get worship services moved back to evenings instead of keeping them in the afternoon. Transition is happening in a big way, with greater possibility of guests attending in the evenings again and even the possibility of having praise team practice again within the next few months (Our band has had to show up and lead worship without any practice for nearly a year).

Thank you for your prayers thus far, and please continue to pray.

Pray that God would work through the transition in leadership and that the next Warden would be favorable to the work our church is doing in the prison.

Pray that the tensions would continue to diminish and that the wellbeing of our men would improve as new normal trends of schedule bring back some of what had been taken away.

Pray that the switch back to evening worship services goes well so that we can again welcome groups who haven't been able to attend with us in the afternoon.

Pray that God would continue to draw to himself the hearts of men who have been far from him so they would take that step of coming to a church program or service for the first time.

Pray that the Bible's, daily devotionals, and many reformed resources that have been flying from the shelves lately are being read and shared so that many more men would grow in the depth of their faith and their understanding of the truth.

Pray that the upcoming Christmas Card Distribution to the men goes well and that God provides all that is needed for the statewide Christmas Sack program (the Christmas Sack program is a bag of goodies for every inmate to remind them they are not forgotten over the Christmas season. This replaced the Christmas Fudge program when home produced goods were no longer allowed.)

Thank you for your prayers and support, May God hear from heaven and bring even more healing to our land.
