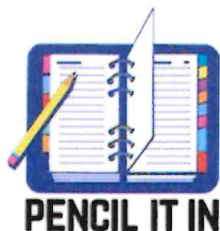

- ***Continue to pray for all those affected by the flood and the daily changes they continue to face in the process of recovery, relocating, and rebuilding.***



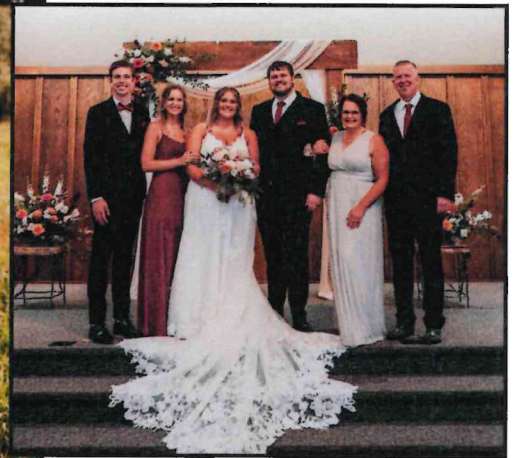

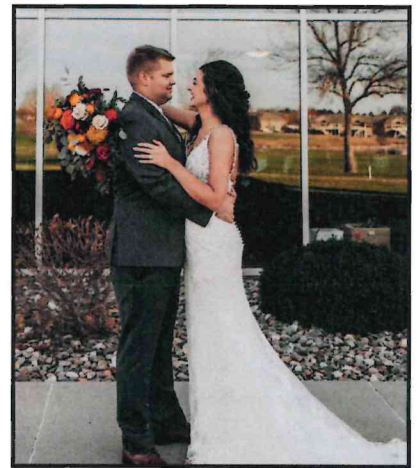
Congratulations Noah & Hannah (Jansma) Krommendyk

Congratulations Charlie & Samantha (Pollema) Poppema

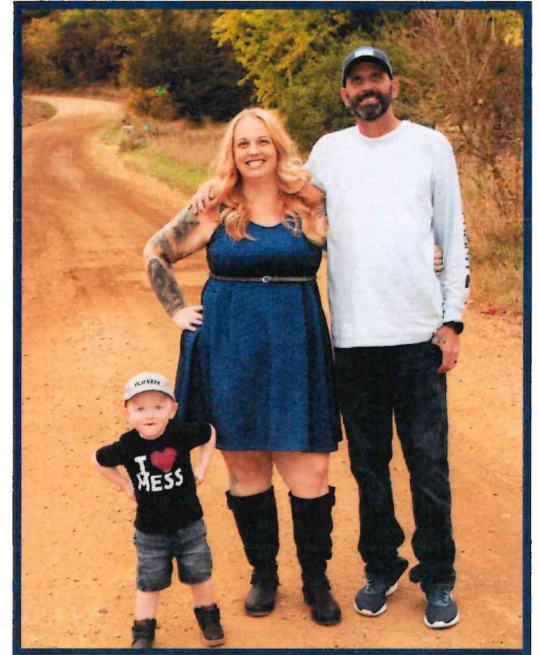

“The Riches of Grace”

One of the hardest words to define in the Christian faith is the work of grace. This isn't to say it can't be defined by Christians who have been saved by it or felt it in their lives. I think there are many experiences that can fill books, shelves, and even libraries detailing the stories of Christ coming to us in the grace of God and in His power. But how do we as earthly human beings begin to describe the Almighty impact of grace? What words can be used to truly describe what grace has meant to us and more importantly what grace can possibly mean to someone coming to the faith for the first time?

As we all know and have experienced there are many ways that one can describe grace. Along with the many stories that I could tell about grace in my own life there is one way of putting grace that means the most to me and perhaps not only that seems to get at the heart of what grace is truly meant to be. This acronym does not limit what God's grace can mean for us, instead, it details the power behind the actions that God has taken on our behalf. Consider the word grace. Each letter signifies a word that describes the action that God has undertaken for us. Ultimately, grace means God's Riches At Christ's Expense.

It's important that we take a moment to look at the words before and after the word at. God's riches are not just some lottery winnings that we happen to win nor are they some collection of wealth left behind by a benefactor after his or her death. Instead, these riches are everything under the power of heaven which ultimately means everything under God's control. It is not limited by human standards nor by human rules. It is everything divinely created by a divine creator who already uses it all for His purposes and His glory.

Now we must look at the two words after the word “at” in this acronym. Christ's expense is not just a limited dollar amount put on him by human rules and standards. It is not just some check written by his hand to donate to our cause in hopes of making life better. No, Christ's expense is ultimately his life. He first gave up the riches of heaven coming to earth. Then he gave up his life on the cross, standing in our place. This simple act carries profound meaning, meaning that gives us far greater reward than we can ever know.

God's Riches At Christ's Expense, grace in a nutshell. This acronym only provides a glimpse of what we receive when we inherit grace as followers of Christ. But it does give us a clear picture of the work that was done on our behalf and on the behalf of those who still have yet to come to Christ. What riches have we in store? What joys are ours to get to behold? In this grace we now stand as children of the heavenly father. In this grace we now stand as inheritors of heaven itself. What rich, marvelous, wondrous grace!

“Amid Life’s Storms”

The hurricanes that battered the East Coast in fall 2024 also battered my soul. I was over the rain and humidity. I was tired of lugging my two preschoolers through the downpours and driving through flash floods at night. Yet I had no reason to complain. Our house was still standing, with no damage.

The news around us was worrying and heartbreaking. “What if that was us?” I wondered. “Would I be strong enough?”

Then the kids asked to play outside. Even though I knew they’d get wet and muddy, I gave in. When a rainbow appeared, I’d never been more humbled as I remembered: I don’t need to be anxious. I don’t need to be strong enough. God watches over us all. He knows the hurt and sorrow. And he promises to be “our refuge and strength, a very present help in trouble.” (Psalm 46:1, ESV)

“Resting in Jesus”

An old hymn declares:

I heard the voice of Jesus say, “Come unto me and rest.

Many people these days feel exhausted by division, the news, hatred that seems louder than love. More than ever, we who are “weary, worn, and sad” need to hear Jesus say, “Come unto me and rest.”

Jesus wants to be our resting place — but not so we can hide forever from reality. Instead, he offers a place of refreshment where we can relax long enough to remember that not everything is bad; there is gospel to share. Not everything is hatred; God’s love is stronger.

Resting in Jesus, we focus on God’s goodness. We are reminded of love shown by kind people to those in trouble, bold voices speaking for justice, warm friendships that brighten our days. Gladdened by rest, we rise again. Jesus walks with us, as always. We can lean on him every step of the way. ~Heidi Hyland Mann

“Two-way Benefits”

“When you do nothing, you feel overwhelmed and powerless,” observed Connecticut politician Pauline Keezer. “But when you get involved, you feel the sense of hope and accomplishment that comes from knowing you are working to make things better.” Indeed, it’s impossible to shine light in someone else’s life without lighting up your own.

We might think being generous toward another with our time or possessions leaves us with less. But as Jesus said, “Whoever loses their life for my sake will find it” (Matthew 10:39, NIV). How common it is that when we minister to others in Christ’s name, we find we have also — or perhaps even more so — received ministry. This is the miracle of God’s love at work.

“Jesus, the Model of Salt and Light”

In Matthew 5:13-16 Jesus tells his followers, “You are the salt of the earth. ... You are the light of the world.” Through his example, our Savior showed us what that means.

“The remarkable thing is that Jesus brought it all into reality in his own person,” writes Bible scholar N.T. Wright in *Matthew for Everyone*. “He was the salt of the earth. He was the light of the world: set up on a hilltop, crucified for all the world to see, becoming a beacon of hope and new life for everybody, drawing people to worship his Father, embodying the way of self-giving love which is the deepest [fulfillment] of the law and the prophets.”

“On the Path to Victory”

After moving to a college town, Pastor Kendra Thompson learned about the athletic phenomenon known as March Madness. And after a nondenominational upbringing, as a young adult she learned about Lenten traditions.

Lent and the NCAA college basketball tournament, which usually coincide, both point to the divine, Thompson argues. “In Lent, with each day we are drawn closer to the crushing reality that we’ve crucified our God. And yet we are also faced with an impossible victory: that death did not win, that our God is raised in Jesus Christ,” she writes. “Likewise, watching college basketball invites us into a season of hoping in unlikely possibilities, marveling at upsets, and giving thanks to God for the connection we find as His people.”

Like fans swept up in high-stakes games, Jesus’ disciples abandon everything to follow him. Lent might be “holy madness,” Thompson muses. It’s “an opportunity to ‘feel’ our religion, not just in our heads but with our skin, our voices, even in the anxieties of our prayers.”

EXPANDING THE KINGDOM FROM THE INSIDE-OUT

In our fall newsletter we highlighted a series of positive changes and answers to prayer in our first few months of scheduled activities after an early fall lockdown kept all prison ministries shut down for a month. 2024 had many disruptions to the schedule, but even as hard as those things were, they pale in comparison to the ways God has demonstrated his faithfulness to the church and his children.

Fall brought sweeping changes, not only getting back in after a month of lockdown, but getting back to better times and rhythms of ministry and seeing exponential growth in participation. Our worship service was able to switch back to the evening time slot which caused it to gain increased attention from the prison population and increased the opportunity for groups to come in from partner churches. After a year without having an official praise team practice time we are back to having a scheduled time weekly for the men on our praise team to prepare for worship and special songs.

We recently had a song saturated service, giving extra time for praise and special music that we hadn't been able to do as much of without practice times. As men clapped along to original praise music written by some of our members the room was filled with such energy that the projector screen on the stage was literally moving.

In the last newsletter, there were a series of prayer requests including:

"Pray that God would continue to draw to himself the hearts of men who have been far from him so they would take that step of coming to a church program or service for the first time."

God has answered that prayer repeatedly the last couple of months. One story that stuck out is include here:

A man requested a visit with me to ask how a person knew they were a follower of Jesus. He had been sent to solitary confinement for something his cellmate had done, but the staff brought them both down for investigation anyway. Between the solitary cells and the recreation cage men can walk in for an hour a day while in that unit there was a tattered book. The guys had been kicking it around each day on their way between the cells and the larger walking cage, joking about the fact that it was written by a female Christian author with each abusive kick when they passed it. Then one day a guard joking asked this man if he wanted a book to read. (continued on back)

At first, he was mad when he was passed the tattered book, but then on one of the remaining pages found a passage from Jeremiah 29 promising that God will be found by those who seek him with their whole heart. This man prayed that God would reveal himself if he were real and over the next 24 hours had a series of unexpected events including staff clearing him of the charge he was in solitary for. He has this strong sense that God must be real for the way He showed up in answer to prayer. As we talked about this guy's first few experiences attending church in his life, he had tears in his eyes as he described the feeling of raising his hands in worship to a God he hadn't known a month earlier, but who showed up when a tattered book was given to him as a joke and the Word of God written in that book sunk into his heart.

Through the changes and challenges these kinds of interactions remind us that God is doing a great work and that we can count on him to continue to be faithful to his promises. Psalm 36:5-7 says, ⁵Your love, Lord, reaches to the heavens, your faithfulness to the skies. ⁶Your righteousness is like the highest mountains, your justice like the great deep. You, Lord, preserve both people and animals. ⁷How priceless is your unfailing love, O God! People take refuge in the shadow of your wings.

In addition to praising God for the great works he has been doing in the lives of men the last few months, Cornerstone is also marking a significant milestone later this year. This summer will mark the 20th anniversary of Cornerstone being a Christian Reformed Church inside the walls of the State Penitentiary.

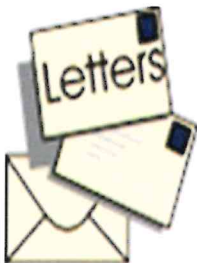
