

### Remembering MaryAnn Van Bemmel

Mary Ann Van Bemmel, 88, of Rock Valley, Iowa, died Tuesday, January 30, 2024, at Whispering Heights in Rock Valley. A funeral service was held Saturday, February 3, at 11:00 AM at the First Christian Reformed Church of Rock Valley with Rev. Matthew Haan officiating.

Mary Ann Van Bemmel, daughter of Peter and Lydia (Vanden Bosch) Wielenga, was born November 18, 1935, at Lebanon, Iowa. In 1952, Mary Ann was united in marriage with Henry Paul Van Bemmel. They spent time living in Iowa, Minnesota, and California until settling on an acreage 1 mile west of Doon, Iowa in 1966. Here they would raise their 4 children until moving to Rock Valley, Iowa in 1993. Henry Paul passed away on August 14, 2007, after a 2 ½ year battle with cancer in which Mary Ann tenderly and lovingly cared for him in their home. Mary Ann moved to Four Seasons in Rock Valley in 2012 and in 2018 she moved to Whispering Heights in Rock Valley.

## Special thanks to several family members for sharing their memories.

Growing up, our lives revolved around the family farm, church and school activities. We all spent many hours doing the daily chores, walking the bean fields, snapping green beans on the front porch, husking sweet corn and canning various fruits and vegetables. We always ate our meals together at the kitchen table, with devotions and prayer. I also recall going through the Heidleberg catechism as part of our devotion time. Both Mom and Dad made sure we had a firm foundation. Mom and I spent many hours doing dishes - she would wash and I would dry. It was here that catechism lessons were reviewed, spelling words and memory verses were practiced, as well as a lot of discussions, conversations and advice given...and I learned to work "efficiently"! Mom taught me how to bake and cook at an early age so when my sister was born shortly before my 11th birthday, I was able to make the meals for our family in her absence. Our home was often filled with music. Mom would play the piano and we would all sing when my grandparents and/or mom's siblings and families visited. I can still hear my grandpa sing "Rock of Ages". Mom also accompanied Verlyn and I as we played guitar and sang at many Sunday night "request programs". (Mom even sewed us matching shirts!)

Mom also played the organ at Doon CRC for 34 years. I remember spending a lot of Saturday afternoons in church with her while she practiced for the upcoming services. I don't recall ever missing a church service except for illness...and we had to be pretty sick! If we had church, regardless of the day or time, we were there. Visiting ministers often had dinner with us (which was always pea soup so it could be made on Saturday) and would stay with us until the 2 pm service. Our teachers were always invited over for coffee somewhere around the beginning of each school year. We were taught to respect our teachers and Mom and Dad both supported them and the school with their time, prayers and dedication to our Christian education. Again, if their was a school event, we were there.

After I married and had children, mom made sure she spoiled my kids as best she could and helped me learn and manage this new phase of life. She rocked and sang to the kids as infants, invited them for sleepovers when they were older and made sure she knew and welcomed their friends as they grew. She enjoyed watching as many of their activities as possible, especially church and school music programs. She also prayed for them and encouraged them to "walk in the ways of the Lord". I think every birthday card they received encouraged them on their faith walk. She loved on them in the best possible way.

When I think back on all the memories of Mom the thing I remember (and now miss) the most is her consistent prayers and love for her family.

In the last years, she often questioned the purpose of her life and I would remind her how much I needed and coveted her prayers. She was my prayer warrior and will be forever loved. ~Bonnie

Many of my favorite memories of my grandma come from sleepovers at her house. The nights would typically end with her reading me Three Billy Goats Gruff as many times as requested. The morning would start with her letting me use as much sugar on my Wheaties as I liked. Then Grandpa would read devotions from a Bible used so frequently that his thumb had made an impression on the back cover. My grandparents provided me with such a consistent example of love and faithfulness that I could never be too thankful for. ~Evan Wiersma

I'll forever remember staying overnight at grandma and grandpa's house when I was young. My brother and I loved it so much and would often pack our bags and wait at the end of our driveway to be picked up. Grandma's house was always a special place where we knew we were welcome. ~Nolan Wiersma

A little over a week ago, Grandma Van Bemmel reached for her coloring book and began carefully coloring her last picture - a picture that she would never finish but instead get to experience the truth and the gift of this promise of God's love fulfilled - the gift of Everlasting Life.

Grandma LOVED Jesus and her family dearly. Her daily prayer was for all to know and love Jesus and it will forever be her legacy and gift to us. Her heart was crafted for kindness and she will be missed. But we are all better for knowing her.



My grandma had a gift for taking small moments and turning them into special memories. I have so many good memories with my grandparents, but here are a few of my favorites.

Whenever we were in her car together she would always sing to me. Once we neared her house the song would always transition to "To Grandma's House We Go," a song I know my mom now sings to my girls.

I was thrilled when my grandparents sold their farmhouse in Doon and moved to town because it meant I could spend even more time with them. My parents would let me sit next to grandma at every night church service. She would pack me extra werthers, which soon became my favorite candy. I later learned this transition from the farm in Doon to town in Rock Valley was very hard on my grandma, so I'm glad I got to be by her side.

Whenever I got the chance I would stay overnight at my grandparent's house. A night with grandpa and grandma meant games galore, grandma playing the piano, countless books, and an ice cream sundae in a fancy cup. I didn't have my ears pierced, so Grandma always let me play with her jewelry box, which was my favorite thing of hers because it was filled with clip-on earrings. Grandma would always pray with me before tucking me into bed, but I'll never forget seeing her kneel by her bed to pray before she crawled into bed. It's one of my most cherished memories of her. She was a prayer warrior for me and so many others. I often thought that's why God kept her on this earth for all those years she longed for heaven.

Grandma's house was the hot spot during summer days at the pool. My cousins and I, along with ten or so of our friends would run to her house at the 3:00 rest break. She would have her famous popsicles (special recipe), chocolate chip cookies and kool-aid for a snack. If she wasn't home she'd leave the back door open along with a note. I often wonder how many popsicles she went through each summer.

My grandma was very good at writing cards and words of encouragement to me and others. I don't think I ever visited my grandma when there wasn't a stack of cards ready to be sent out or put in church mailboxes. I struggled with homesickness when I was younger, so my grandma would always write me notes for each day that I would be gone from home. She also always reminded me that no matter where I was, we would always be looking at the same moon. Throughout her time in the nursing home she spent many hours coloring bookmarks and cards for church members and my family.

My grandparents always showed up for me at school and sporting events. When my grandpa got sick, my grandma became his primary caregiver but they still came to what they could. This has always meant a lot to me. Grandma even came to watch me teach at Rock Valley Christian's open house during my first year. This still puts a smile on my face each year at open house because I can picture her sitting in the corner. She was always my biggest encourager. She would come to my classroom after school hours and help me organize or cut. In later years my mom or I would have to bring it to her, but she loved to sit and cut my school material out. She actually still cut out the name tags for the students I'm teaching this school year.

I'm so thankful I was blessed with a wonderful grandma who got to meet all my girls and share countless memories with us. She loved Quincy, Remi and Sydnee and was always eager to hear their stories or read to them when we all visited. My grandma taught me to love the Lord, but she also showed me how to serve others. When I think about all my memories of grandma, I see how much love and effort she put into her relationship with people. She took time for the people around her, and she loved them well. We love and miss her, but are so thankful she is with Jesus right where she longed to be. ~Stephanie Wiersma

Coffee time each Sunday we'd catch up on the gossip, some stories hard to believe- it was kind of a toss up!

You spent a lot of time here: coloring detailed pictures.

# "God's Family"

"You will notice we say 'brother and sister' 'round here- It's because we're a family and the folks are so dear." This is the first verse of a popular hymn written by Bill and Gloria Gaither titled "The Family of God." Though written in 1970, this song has become a favorite of many and I know it may be a favorite of many readers of this piece. Just this first verse details the communal aspect that we all hope and aspire to hold as members of the family of God.

This song also causes me a bit of reflection. We see ourselves as the family of God within our church communities and the greater church both state and worldwide. But do we live up to this status, to this relationship we have given ourselves and taken on? This isn't meant to be a status check in the eyes of God. Our salvation does not depend on us doing this. However, it does give us the opportunity to reflect on our relationship to the greater family of God and how we can get even better at the task of loving our neighbor and being a part of God's family.

You could flip through the religious channels on television and come across what is called a mega church. This church can tend to have way more members than your local congregation, at least according to church records. You often wonder how everyone finds guidance at a church like this and you can understand why some churches have multiple pastors that seek to help the congregations in various roles. This doesn't put a limit on what God does in any situation, but I'm thankful to be part of my local congregation with a dedicated pastor, elders, deacons and others who care in their own ways. Furthermore, I'm thankful to be a part of a greater church community that comes together in small ways to be a blessing to one another, whether that be combined services and events, the sharing of pastors for pulpit filling or any other of the many perhaps behind the scenes ways that churches come together.

I believe it's easier in our congregations/families to reach out and show genuine care and love to one another. But the other question that arises is: how often do we do this? How often do we as "regular" church members actually reach out in care and consideration to others? Or do we leave those tasks to the pastors, elders, and deacons of the church? I would say that I have found myself opting for the second solution. It is a goal, that we all can get better at regardless of status in the church, the goal of becoming even more united as the family of God. How do we do that? A simple way to start is to take a look at last week's bulletin or announcement sheet. Pray for the people, families, situations and causes that are mentioned on the sheet. Next week, when the bulletin arrives in your inbox or in your hand, do the same thing. You may be praying for the same people every week or you may be praying for new opportunities and situations. Perhaps God will even lay it on your heart to take it a step further than prayer. Lord willing, it will allow us to put memories and moments behind the words when we sing "The Family of God" the next time. Lord willing, and with the help of the Triune God, we can take on the opportunity to become even more united, even more bonded in love and service as the family of God.

#### "Come Glorify God Together"

\*First, show up — in person if you can. Examine your heart and your motivation for attending church. \*Lift up your eyes from earthly matters to focus on God.

\*Come prepared. Do you need to confess anything or remove any hindrance?

\*As you worship, consider how each part of the service displays the gospel: greeting, singing, confessing, reading Scripture, hearing Bible-based teaching, praying, giving and communing.

\*Be careful not to compartmentalize corporate worship as separate from the rest of life. Instead, consider how you'll carry the experience into the coming week.

\*Come ready to receive; then let that overflow fuel you for the days ahead.

\*Come prepared to participate, knowing that worshiping together is a rehearsal for heaven.

\*But most importantly! Just come.

# Locked Down, but Lifted Up

The passage tied to our church name and featured in the top right corner of every newsletter comes from 1 Peter 2. Later in that same chapter you can also read: 19 For it is commendable if someone bears up under the pain of unjust suffering because they are conscious of God. 20 But how is it to your credit if you receive a beating for doing wrong and endure it? But if you suffer for doing good and you endure it, this is commendable before God. 21 To this you were called, because Christ suffered for you, leaving you an example, that you should follow in his steps.

While these verses were applied to how believers can be a royal priesthood in this life while they were slaves in an ancient civil system, it has direct application to the lives of the men who make up Cornerstone Prison Church. Peter's concern was that Christians face suffering well, recognizing a connection to Christ's suffering for our sake and that how we suffer can point the world to Christ. While none of us want to suffer, we do experience suffering in this time. Recently there was a disturbance at the prison. Tensions had run high, after many beneficial opportunities had been reduced over months. Then there was an additional change that radically reduced communication between the men and their families. In the wake of the disturbance all the men in the prison were locked down. It has become fairly common that when a few men act up they all get locked down. This means chapel services end up being cancelled. It was a stark contrast this year, having the joy of Easter and a great evening at our annual banquet while the men of Cornerstone were locked down and the chapel was closed without knowing when services would resume. For a couple of weeks, the men were locked down, but that wasn't the whole story because many followers of Christ were lifting them up in prayer.

As we continue to navigate difficult times, we greatly appreciate the prayers and support of the broader church. I especially encourage you to continue to lift up the men at the times they suffer for the negative actions of others around them. Pray that the way they navigate these difficult times would bring glory to God and give others glimpse of the freedom available in Jesus Christ. Pray that by the work of the Holy Spirit they would feel that even when locked down they are in fact being lifted up.
